# DRAW OR PASTE

Use the Draw or Paste pages to create a nice color booklet. The pages can be printed on card stock and bound together. Draw or paste things of the appropriate color on each page.

# FLASHCARDS

Here are a few ideas for using the color word flashcards:

Print the color words. Cut out the color words and glue them onto the appropriate color of construction paper. Make a matching set. Match the color words. Laminate.

Print the color words on card stock. Cut out the color words and make a matching set. You can color around the color words. Play a memory game. Laminate.

# WORD STRIPS

Here are a few ideas for using the color word strips:

# MINI BOOKS

Here are a few ideas for using the mini books:

Print out the color mini books. Draw or paste a picture to go with each word. Cut out the mini book. Glue it onto the appropriate color of construction paper. Staple it all together.

Print out the color mini books. Cut out the mini book. Staple it all together. Have the children draw or paste pictures of the appropriate items. Put the mini book into a lap book.

Print out the color mini books. Cut up the mini books. Paste into a file folder (to create a file folder game). Gather the appropriate pictures and laminate them. Put velcro on the empty squares and on the backs of the pictures. Use as a file folder game. Each individual color could be its own file folder game.

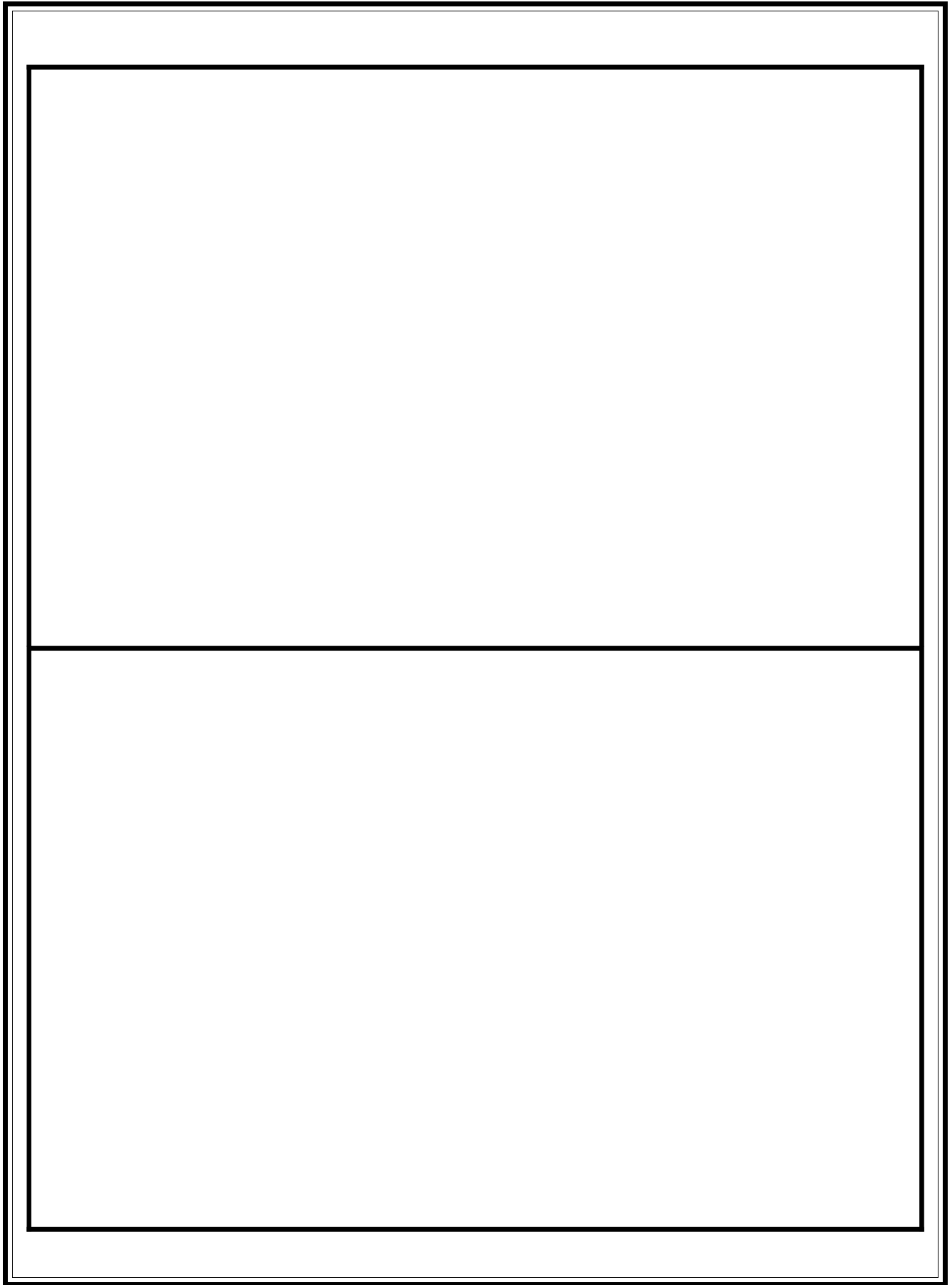
# COLOR MATS

Color mats can be used for sorting small objects by color. There are three different kinds of color mats. You can use pompoms, squares of construction paper, counters, or anything else you like.

The first one has 4 squares on a page for sorting. You simply print it out. Print the color words of the colors that you would like the child to sort in the square. You could also glue the square onto the appropriate color of construction paper. Then you can laminate for durability.

The second one has 2 squares on a page for sorting. You simply print it out. Print the color words of the colors that you would like the child to sort into the rectangle. This could also be glued onto the appropriate color of construction paper. Then you can laminate for durability.

The third set has the color word at the top of each page. You can print this onto paper and then glue onto the appropriate color of construction paper. Then you can laminate for durability.

# ADDITIONAL IDEAS

Have a color of the week (or day). Focus on that color. Do crafts related to that color. Read books related to that color.

Have a color basket. When you are studying a specific color, gather things that are that color and put them in your basket.

Play color eye spy. Give clues to the child and have them search for things that match the clues.

Play color hide and seek. Hide things that are the color you are studying and have the children search for them. You can do this like a scavenger hunt and have a short list of things for the child to search for.

You can go on a color walk and see how many different things you can see that are the color you are studying. You can take pictures of each thing that you find and put them into a color scrapbook.

You can make word lists of things that are each of the different colors. You can use this idea to increase vocabulary.

You could make poster boards for each of the different colors studied and then sew them together with yarn to become a gigantic color book.

You can do a color collage by gathering magazine pictures, wrapping paper, scrapbooking paper, etc and pasting it onto a piece of card stock.

You can make color place mats for each member of the family using their favorite color.

Do an art project using whatever color you choose. Use only THAT color in your project. Use whatever material that you like, but only that color.

Think of your own creative ideas to use when you are studying your colors.
